



Behold, I am the servant of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word. Luke 1:38

Mary responds to Gabriel's words with an incredible willingness to yield to the Lord. The result, is the Word begins to be formed within her. The Word becomes flesh. The becoming takes time.

Not only the divine "just the right time" in history when Jesus comes and is crucified for us (Romans 5:6), but the 9 months of human gestation. Waiting for the Word to be formed in us involves waiting, it involves *eagerly* waiting, participating with God in the waiting.

This is true for all who believe and follow Jesus. There is the moment, the 'just the right time' when Christ saves, when we are born from above (John 3:3). And there is Christ being formed in us (Galatians 4:19, Romans 12:1-2, 2 Corinthians 5:16-21) which involves an active waiting on the Lord. There are ways to respond to Christ's saving work in us that cooperates with the process of His life forming within us. This process is described in various terms: discipleship, following, abiding... all with the purpose of living this life in the flesh by faith in the Son of God, who loved us and gave Himself for us (Galatians 2:20). Our part in this process is our gift to God, the gift of our lives returned to the One who created us, and continues to work in us for His good pleasure (Philippians 2:13).

So what does our responding look like? We worship. We glorify God in our daily living with the attitude of Christ in us and the fruit of His Spirit manifest through us: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Galatians 5:22-23). We gather regularly with other believers to bear this fruit in practical ways with one another and for those who do not yet know Christ. Our works of love, forgiveness, service as well as our words of peace, truth, kindness are ways in which we worship, bringing hope to others and glory to God.

In our becoming we are formed and fashioned together as a means of God's grace in the world. We bear witness to the faithfulness of God (even when our faithfulness is waning). We bear witness to the One who is strong when we are weak, to the One who knew no sin but became sin for us so that we may become His righteousness (Acts 1:8; Romans 1:16; 2 Corinthians 5:20-21, 8:9, 12:10).

In a world which seeks to form and fashion us into its image, worship is how God returns us to our fearfully and wonderfully made place, abiding in Him, the vine who nourishes us. In worship we are reminded and encouraged to live up to the kind we are in Christ. In worship we present our lives for His good pleasure and purpose for the sake of those who do not yet know Him. You see, as we respond to God's Word, Christ is formed within us and we are sent into the world to transform the lives of others in the power of the Holy Spirit (Romans 12:1-2).

May this Christmas season be a time to return to the shepherd and guardian of our souls (1 Peter 2:25). May God's Word teach, reprove, correct, and train us for every good work (2 Timothy 3:16). May we come and adore the Christ who has come to bring us Himself: the good news of great joy which is for all the people (Luke 2:10). May we all live, move, and have our being in Him, according to His Word! Merry Christmas!





Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Gifts!

Imitate Christ, not Culture

Humans, by nature, compare and imitate. We observe and identify traits/actions in others and attempt to copy them. Have you ever copied a haircut you saw in the movies? Imitated an accent or manner of speaking? What about a groovy dance move? We also fall into patterns of mimetic desire, in which we want what others want or have. When the trendiest Christmas gift is sold out, we desire it even more than when the shelves were stocked. Others wanted it and have it, so I must need it. In today's loud consumerism world, if you don't consciously think about what you desire, you will be told what you are to want. Not only this, but you will be told that satisfying your personal desires is your main objective. It isn't. Rather, as Christians, we are to "glorify God and enjoy Him forever" (Westminster Catechism, Psalm 96, Colossians 1:16).

We become that which we imitate. We become like that which we choose to pay the most attention to. Devote the most time to. What (or who) are you imitating? What are you paying the most attention to? How do you spend your time? The distracting and self-focused world works to separate us from our true identity, rooted in Jesus Christ (Genesis 1:27, John 1:12, 1 Peter 2:9). We are to imitate Him (Ephesians 5:1, 1 Thessalonians 1:6, 1 Corinthians 11:1, 1 Peter 2:21). We are to set our minds on Him, not on the glitzy items of this blindly colorful, temporary world (Colossians 3:1-4). We read His Word (all of it) and obey Him (Psalm 1, 1 John 2:1-6, Timothy 3:14-17). We love Him and teach our family to love Him and walk in His way, knowing if we don't fill and disciple the little ones, the world will (<u>Deuteronomy 6:3-9</u>, <u>Proverbs 1:1-9</u>). We focus, not on self or culture, but on Christ, our beloved Savior (Hebrews 12:1-2).

Every day, but especially at Christmas time, we remember that we have everything, because we believe in a Savior who came, not for a cradle, but for the cross. To take our sin and bear our shame (Romans 5:8, 1 John 2:2). We have faith in God who gave us His only Son, granting us restoration, hope and life everlasting with Him (John 3:16-18). May you ponder this glorious gift in your heart this season, doing all your tasks to the best of your ability, for the glory of God, imitating and seeking Christ our Lord (Colossians 3:23, 1 Corinthians 10:31, Romans 11:36).

becoming (1% of each month = 7 hours)

- extended time with 'family' members in smaller settings (Acts 2:42)
 - 1 Corinthians 3:16-17, 2 Corinthians 5:17-21; Galatians 2:20; Ephesians 4:11-16, 32-33;

blessing (2% of each year = 1 week)

- living, loving, and serving in the community (Acts 1:8)
 - Jeremiah 29:7; John 17:13-19; Matthew 28:18-20; Philippians 2:1-4; Galatians 5:1, 13, 22-25

A Resurrection Walk / Prayer Path Proposal:

Many of you have already heard about this project and even seen the drawings in the entryway and fellowship hall. So, this will be more of an update and reminder of why we are presenting this project. Peace Lutheran Church belongs to all of us, therefore when someone comes along with a plan to utilize this property, it takes a congregational vote to approve it. Our project team is hoping to provide you with enough information that you will see the potential in this project and approve our moving ahead with it at our Annual Meeting in January.

The purpose for this project is to create an outdoor area that would beautify our "backyard"...a garden with walking path, water feature, scripture stops and an intentional area of remembrance. A space filled with native wildflowers, grasses, bushes and trees, where one can enjoy the beauty of God's creation, pray, reflect, and remember the gift of Christ's resurrection; while watching joyfully each year as the garden grows, changes, and reveals its beauty in new ways with new life!

The first part of the path would encircle a water feature and have plantings to provide some quiet comfort and benches for those who just want to pause for a bit or perhaps are unable to walk the entire path. A place to sit in quiet and remember a loved one and to visit with the God who loves us. A place of "Peace on the Prairie!" Then imagine at the far end of the path a mounded area filled with and surrounded by prairie grasses and aspen trees, with the wind sweeping through them...a reminder of Pentecost?

It would be a path that meanders with places to stop and read the scriptures from plaques placed on tall basalt stones...Jesus words after His resurrection. Around those "scripture stations" paver stones will be placed; names of those we want to remember, or honor can be engraved on them. There will be benches periodically placed along the way.

We have a landscape project manager, Courtney, who is graciously working with us, at no cost to us, to assess, analyze and present a cost estimate...not a bid. All the funds needed to create this project would come from donations and memorials specific to this project, not from any pledged or unpledged church funds, nor from any benevolence or budgeted monies.

The comment cards you see in the entryway are available for you to share ideas, questions, concerns. Our initial goal is to be able to bring you on board with your understanding of the project, your excitement in seeing it created, your participation in caring for it, your willingness in hands on planting, and your desire to use and to invite others to use! We will continue sharing how it will be funded!
